In response to your recent request, we have reviewed the New York Natural Heritage Program database with respect to the above project.

We have no records of rare or state-listed animals or plants, or significant natural communities at the project site.

Within one mile of the project site are two documented locations of **Timber Rattlesnake** (*Crotalus horridus*, state listed as Threatened). Individual animals may travel 1.5 miles or more from documented locations. For most sites, comprehensive field surveys have not been conducted. 



Dear Shannon Rattigan:

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (Service) received on March 17, 2022 your effects determination for the 'Old Mill Road' (the Action) using the northern long-eared bat (*Myotis septentrionalis*) key within the Information for Planning and Consultation (IPaC) system. This IPaC key assists users in determining whether a Federal action is consistent with the activities analyzed in the Service's January 5, 2016, Programmatic Biological Opinion (PBO). The PBO addresses activities excepted from "take" prohibitions applicable to the northern long-eared bat under the Endangered Species Act of 1973 (ESA) (87 Stat.884, as amended; 16 U.S.C. 1531 et seq.).

Based upon your IPaC submission, the Action is consistent with activities analyzed in the PBO. The Action may affect the northern long-eared bat; however, any take that may occur as a result of the Action is not prohibited under the ESA Section 4(d) rule adopted for this species at 50 CFR §17.40(o). Unless the Service advises you within 30 days of the date of this letter that your IPaC-assisted determination was incorrect, this letter verifies that the PBO satisfies and concludes your responsibilities for this Action under ESA Section 7(a)(2) with respect to the northern long-eared bat.

Please report to our office any changes to the information about the Action that you submitted in IPaC, the results of any bat surveys conducted in the Action area, and any dead, injured, or sick northern long-eared bats that are found during Action implementation. If the Action is not completed within one year of the date of this letter, you must update and resubmit the information required in the IPaC key.

This IPaC-assisted determination allows you to rely on the PBO for compliance with ESA Section 7(a)(2) <u>only</u> for the northern long-eared bat. It **does not** apply to the following ESA-protected species that also may occur in the Action area:

- Bog Turtle *Glyptemys muhlenbergii* Threatened
- Monarch Butterfly Danaus plexippus Candidate

If the Action may affect other federally listed species besides the northern long-eared bat, a proposed species, and/or designated critical habitat, additional consultation between you and this Service office is required. If the Action may disturb bald or golden eagles, additional coordination with the Service under the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act is recommended.

Depending on the nature of the project and the conditions at the project site, further information from on-site surveys or other resources may be required to fully assess impacts on biological resources.

For information regarding other permits that may be required under state law for regulated areas or activities (e.g., regulated wetlands), please contact the Permits staff at the NYSDEC Region 3 Office as described above.

You may want to contact USFWS if those are federally protected species but again for DEC, we do not have records of bog turtles or northern long-eared bats near this site. Only timber rattlesnake.

Thank you. Given this acreage, the wetlands on or near the project site would meet the 12.4-acre size threshold (eligible wetlands) to be regulated by New York State under Article 24 of Environmental Conservation Law. Eligible wetlands that meet the regulatory criteria but are not shown on the regulatory maps should be afforded the same level of protection as the wetlands that are currently on the regulatory map. Wetlands provide functions and benefits to the people on New York State as outlined in Article 24. All development should be planned to avoid state-regulated wetlands and the 100-foot adjacent areas to the maximum extent
